

A Message From Our Leaders




ROCK 'N BOWL




















Awards Night




Recyclers take care of the green boxes in all the classrooms, the blue can containers throughout the cafeteria and school and they individually empty all the office paper.

The bloom came off the rose in an ugly, penalty filled game against Catholic Central, and a regular season ending loss to an excellent Herman team.


The regular season came to a close with a record of three wins, three losses and a tie, thus putting us into a third consecutive semifinal; a rather superb achievement considering the rocky start.






At this point the team felt great, and perticipated in four tournaments. Jake VanDongen was named the best tournament

All the teams would like to thank their coaches and many supporters.








Massey Wrestling Season Nearly Destroyed.




Mustang Tennis Team Blows Competition Away.

And that is why we hang up stockings for Santa to fill on Christmas Day.


