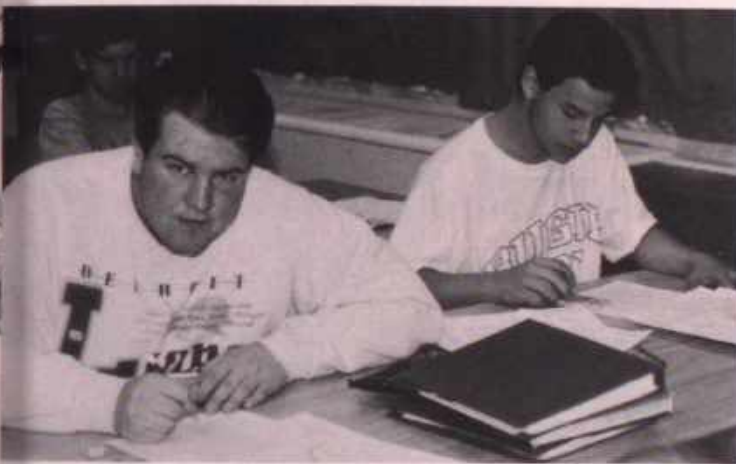


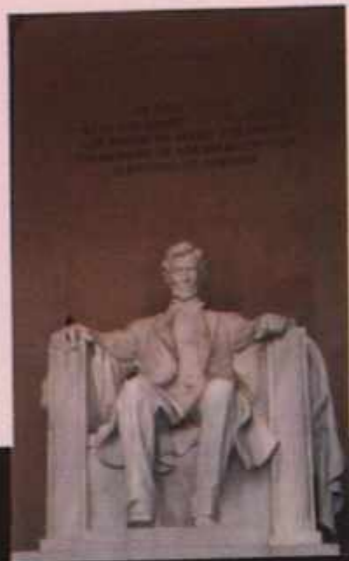

To the graduates, I wish you continued success. I'm glad I had the chance to meet you.

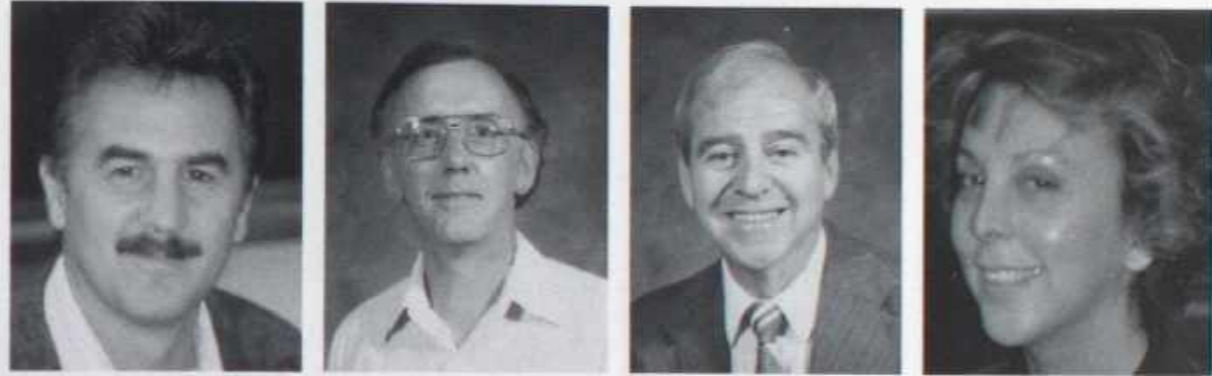

JASON PANNUNZIO

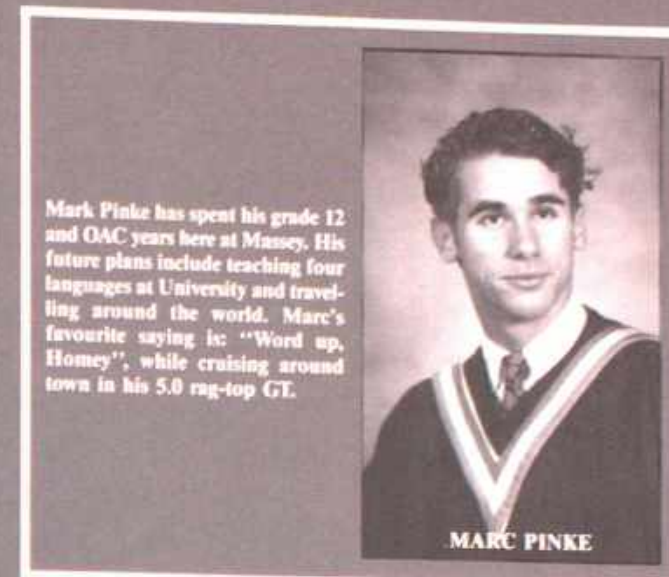

Death

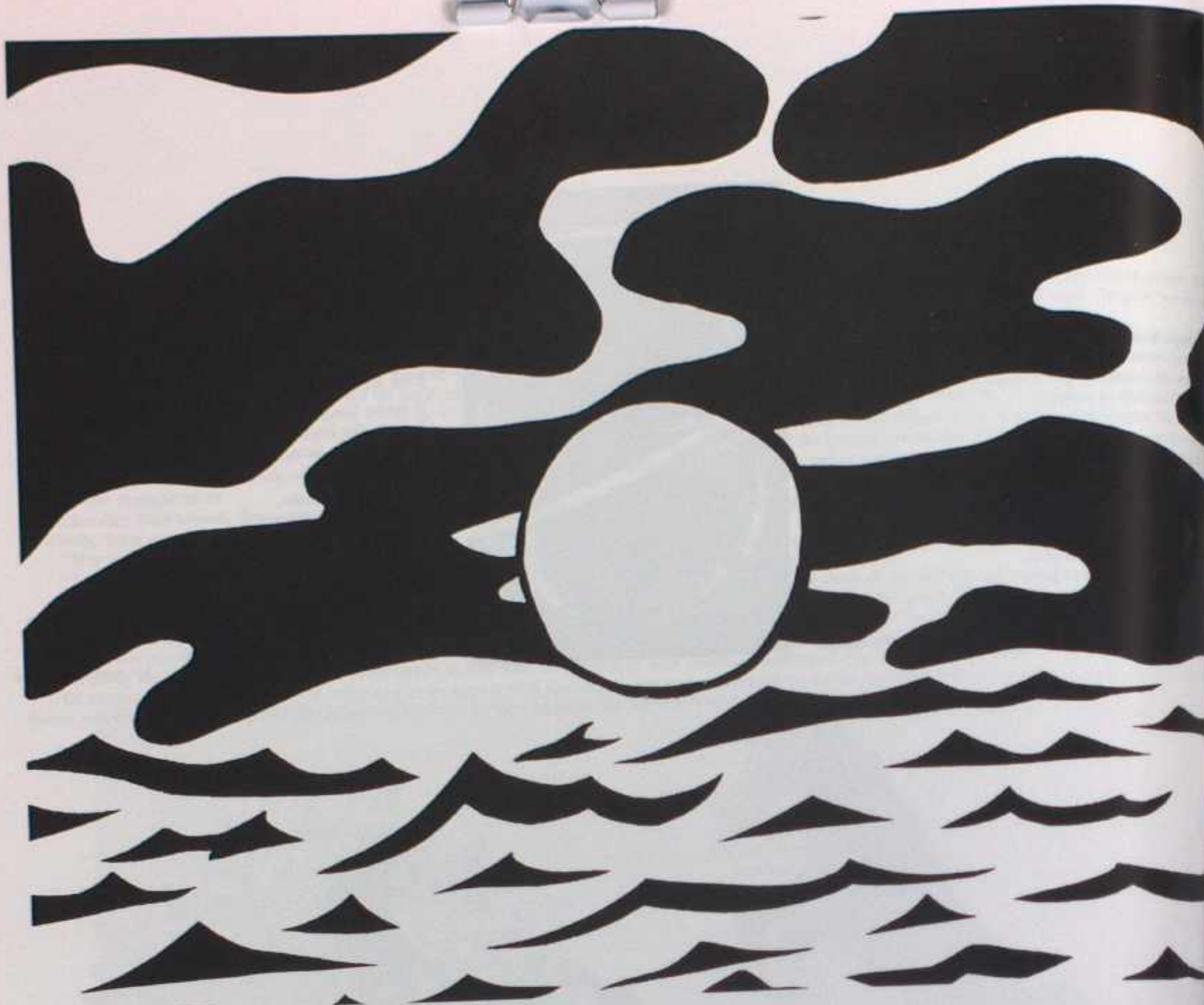

Leaf 2: You are right, but it's still sad.

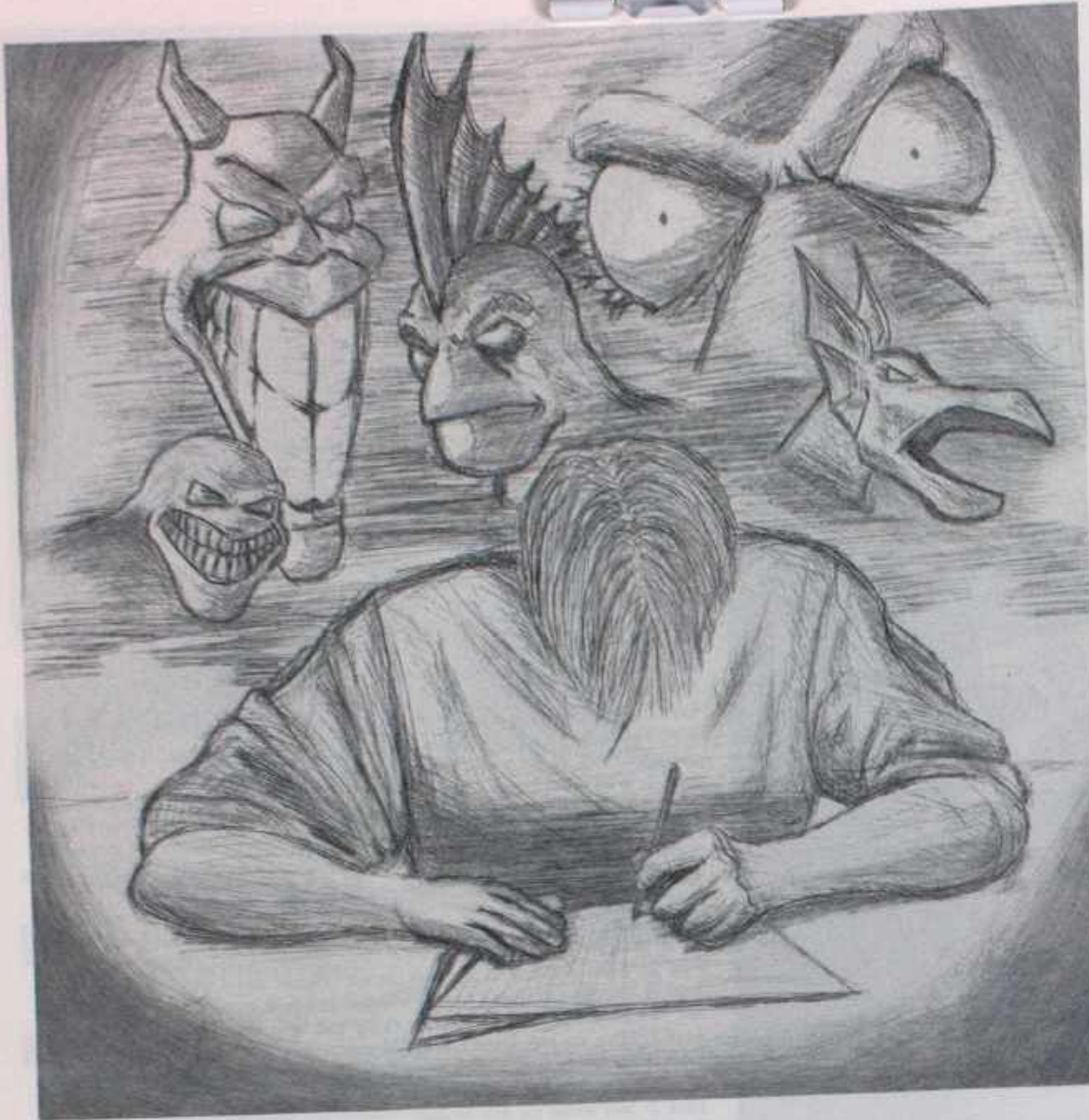
Leaf 1: Death always is. Just look forward to the great fall ahead of you; all leaves do.

Massey's outstanding football coach, Mr. Janisse has decided to retire from coaching. His achievements in this field are very impressive.

He started coaching in 1961 at Herman. There, his Senior Boys' Football Team won the championship in 1969 and 1978. He also coached track and field and his Midget Track Team were All Ontario Champions in 1971.

Mr. Janisse was also assistant coach of the AKO Fratern in 1962, 1967, 1968, 1969, 1975, 1979, and 1980. He was head coach in 1979 and 1980.

From 1972 until 1982, Mr. Janisse ran Developmental Camps in Windsor, for the Ottawa Roughriders Football Club.

In 1979, he was at Walkerville Collegiate, but in 1980 he was transferred to Vincent Massey. He has coached football every year since then, and led the Senior Boys' Football Team to the championship in 1982, 1986, 1987, and 1992.

Mr. Janisse was the assistant coach of the Select Baseball Team from 1982 until 1993. They were Canadian champions in 1986 and 1988.

He also coached Mustang Track and Field every year. In 1987, the team won WSSAA, SWOSSA, and Regional Overall Championships. They were again WSSAA champions in 1988, and OFSAA West Regional champions in 1990.

His dedication and commitment to Mustang athletics will be sadly missed. Thank you.



Mr. Pocock, the exceptional Mustang Swim Team coach has also decided to retire from coaching. His devotion to Massey is shown in his assistance to other areas of sports such as football and cross country.

He came to Vincent Massey in 1965. He coached the Junior Boys' Football Team for five years. They won the championship in 1968.

Mr. Pocock was one of the original Windsor Aquatic Club coaches in the 1960s.

His most rewarding successes were in Mustang swimming, which he has coached for 29 years. A swimmer of Mr. Pocock's even went to the Olympics!

Under his guidance the team has won numerous WSSAA and OFSAA championships. In the 70's, the Massey Swim Team won the All Ontario Finals in six out of seven years. In 1979, the Girls' Team were OFSAA champions and in 1990, the Senior Boys' Team won OFSAA. In 1991, the Senior Boys' placed third at OFSAA.

He was also secretary and treasurer of WSSAA for over 25 years.

In addition, Mr. Pocock has coached the Cross Country Team. They were All Ontario Champions four times in the 1970's and won WSSAA in 1992 and 1993.

The athletic teams of Massey will miss all your years of hard work and devotion. Thank you.

Exceptional Math Teacher



Mr. Nicholas, one of the best math teachers ever, has retired. He has devoted 34 years of his life to helping students.

He started teaching at Essex High School in 1960. A year later, he was at Patterson Collegiate.

Mr. Nicholas went to Kennedy in 1964 and became head of the math department while still in his twenties. There, he coached hockey and pole vault. He also officiated in track and field for many years.

In 1987, he came to Vincent Massey. Since then, he has coached the Mustang Swim Team every year. Under his direction, the team has won many city and provincial championships.

Although he was only at Massey for seven years, he is a legend in his teaching of mathematics. His methods were very unique and very effective. He brought out the best in both strong and weak students. In Mr. Nicholas's class, you didn't need to keep notes because he made sure it was all in your head. He has creative shortcuts such as "playing Las Vegas", "The Wall Game", "Vodka" and "Same Last Names". Students were also taught never to "commit adultery".

Mr. Nicholas taught the Pythagorean Theorem by explaining to students that the hypotenuse squared was written down first, because the right angle in the triangle was really the blood shot eye of a drunken man in a pyramid, and the first thing he saw was the wall across from him.

Every class started with a warm-up. This involved a couple of students going up to the board one at a time to complete a question in front of the class. You also had to explain it as you did it. This helped students to become comfortable in front of an audience and also reinforced their understanding of different concepts.

Then Mr. Nicholas taught a lesson or there was a work period. He always gave students a lot of time in class to work on assignments because that way he was there to answer questions and help with problems.

Mr. Nicholas is a phenomenal teacher who totally changed my opinion of math. He taught me that math can be fun and is just a game. For that I will be forever grateful. On behalf of all the Mustangs, who will miss you tremendously, thank you.

Nobody can pass room 223 without noticing that the students' heads are buzzing with thoughts of functions and radicals, and that the teacher never shies from a tentative question from the gallery.

And no math student can consider their learning experience complete without ever having heard the words "HIKE!" or "AAGH!" said to them, or having had to duck a flying sponge-brick.

In room 223, all other thoughts are left at the door, for this classroom is the domain of Bruce White.

Mr. White has been teaching in Windsor, with continued success, since 1966 (long enough to have taught every child in my family). At last he has been recognized for his achievements, with two prestigious and honoured awards.

In October, at Massey's Academic Awards Night, The Mathematical Association of America honoured Mr. White by presenting him with the Edith May Sliffe Award for distinguished High School Mathematics teaching. Mr. White was one of twenty-four teachers, across North America, to have been granted the award, which recognizes those teachers responsible for the highest scoring teams on the annual American High School Mathematics Examinations (the A.H.S.M.E.). This international recognition could not have been more deserving of Mr. White who has a long history of excellence in both University of Waterloo, and A.H.S.M.E. annual contests.

Mr. White's second award, the Prime Minister's Award for Excellence in Math, Science, or Technology, is awarded to seven teachers in Ontario. It wasn't a fellow teacher or principal who was responsible for the nomination, it was Mr. Omar Hageniers, whose children are students of Mr. White, who nominated him for the award. The nomination in itself attested to Mr. White's excellence: once word of his nomination reached the ears of former students, letters of accolade began arriving. Among these letters was a poem that a student had written in 1977, which reflected how Mr. White's techniques are deeply rooted within him.

Nominees for this award are required to excel under specific criteria, which Mr. White easily met.

Having been influenced by Mr. White's mathematical mind for three years, I am in awe of his accomplishments. On behalf of the Massey Mustangs, I extend congratulations and leave you with this thought (relayed to me by a very kind man): "We often do not recognize what is in our own back yard."

Congratulations again Mr. White, and keep up the teaching style which is unique to only you (it appears to be working)!

SCIENCE OLYMPIAD

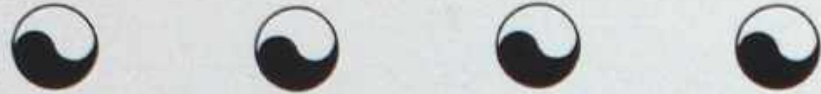
