OPPORTUNITIES

All through history changing times have given pessimists the opportunity to point out that difficulties and problems involved in the change will lead to the deterioration of the race and culture concerned. In our own day there have been dire predictions—often headlined—that our youth in general, and secondary school youth in particular, consist to a large degree of delinquents or semi-delinquents. There is no doubt that city living, automation, television and cars, and other symptoms of an affluent society introduce problems to school youth, their parents, and their teachers.

But history shows that changing times have made for progress and development undreamed of by the pessimist. There is plenty of evidence that our own changing times present greater opportunities than were ever available before, and that our youth are taking advantage of them. A larger proportion of teen agers are now in school. They can choose from a greater variety of courses. The "Robarts' Plan" which will next year be implemented at the Grade 10 level in our school is a splendid example of progress in this direction. In spite of reports to the contrary there has been, and will be for at least one more year ample opportunity in Ontario universities for all who qualify and indicate a wish to enroll (with some minor exceptions in certain narrow fields).

There is objective evidence that youth is taking advantage of these greater opportunities. A larger proportion of our graduates are going to university (about 60% in 1962). Absenteeism has been reduced (15% fewer absentees in 1961 than in 1951). More scholarships are available, and are being won by our Walkerville pupils (1951—\$7,700; 1961—\$13,400).

The opportunities that really matter are opportunities that cannot be measured in dollars. Opportunities to work for a better world are greater than ever before. Our young people have the whole world spread before them. Distances and difficulties of communication that hindered this effort even ten years ago no longer exist. I am convinced that the students we are preparing for life are going into a world of greater opportunities, and that they will live up to the greater responsibilities involved.

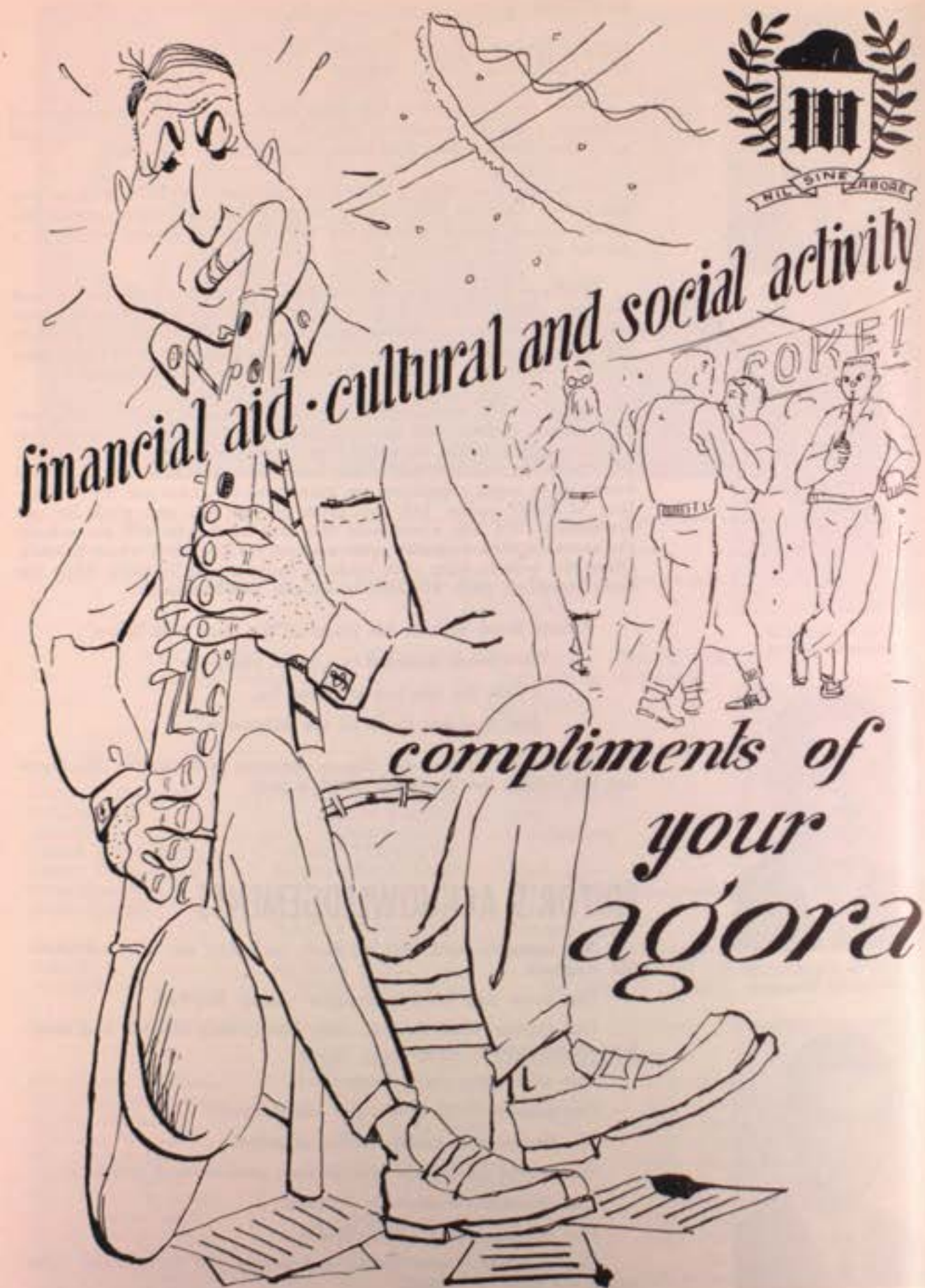

HONOUR SOCIETY

The Honour Society was set up in 1959 to give the students of Walkerville Collegiate an opportunity to gain merit for their achievements.

Students become members by gaining points for—

- Academic achievements
- Athletic participation
- Participation in the student council and clubs
- Services and talents.

When a student acquires 100 points he becomes a member of the Honour Society, for which he receives a crest. At 175 points he receives further honour and a ring. At 250 points he receives an individual trophy which is presented at commencement exercises and his picture is mounted on the wall. No more than seventy points from one category may be obtained in six years.

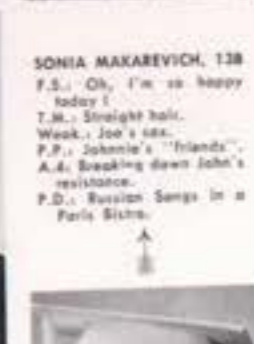

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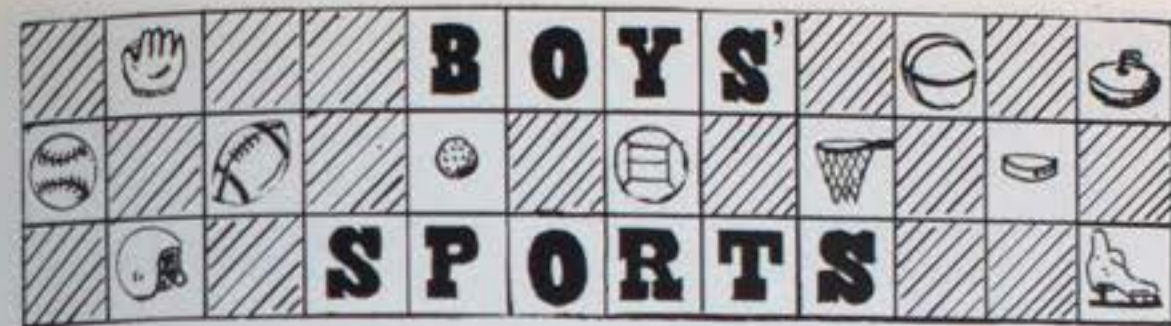

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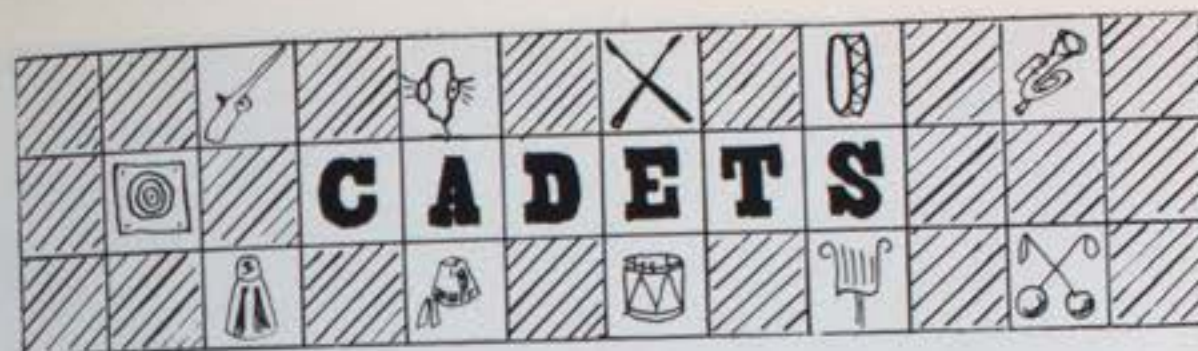
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C.O.'s MESSAGE

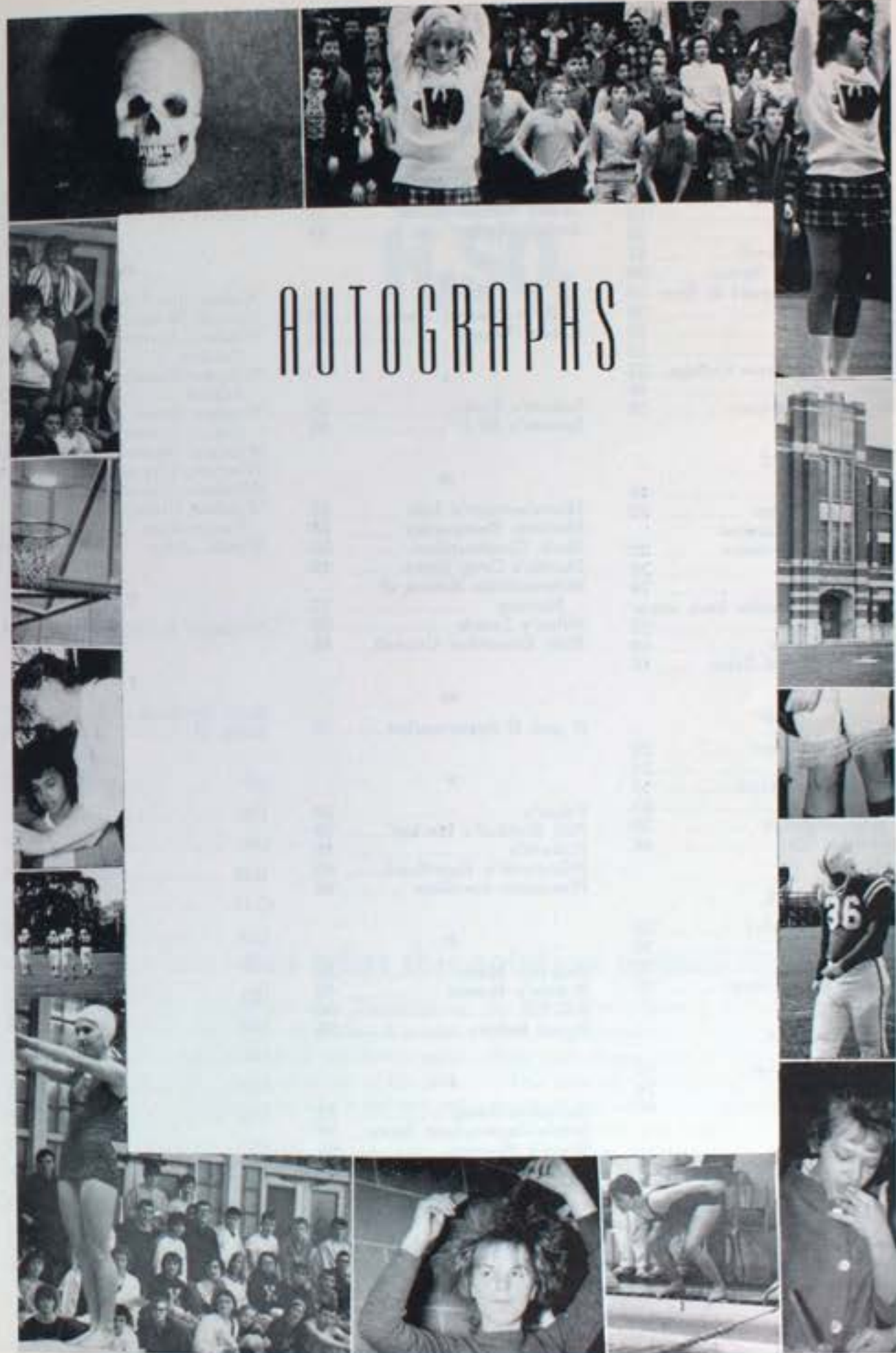
