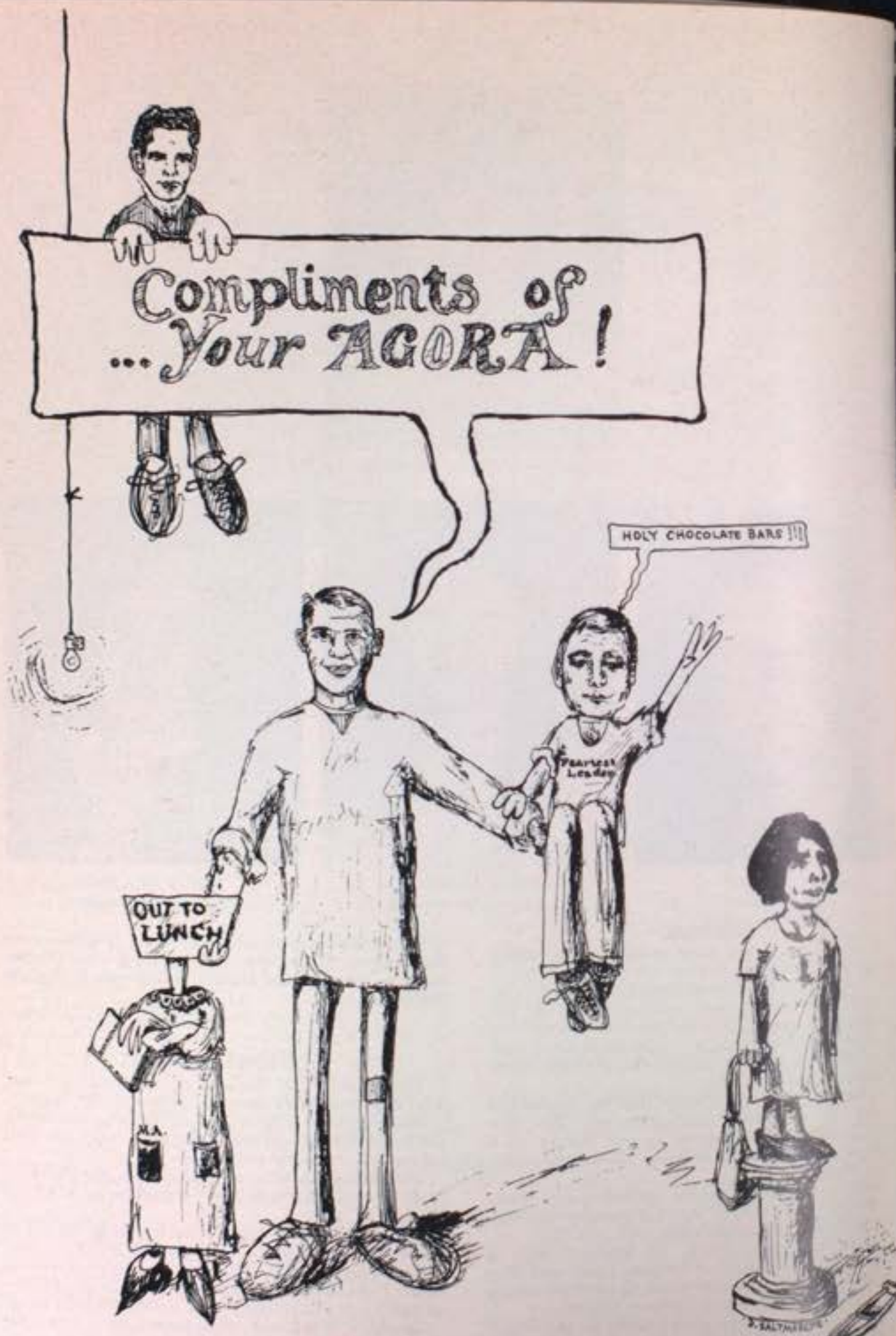

THE HONOUR SOCIETY
