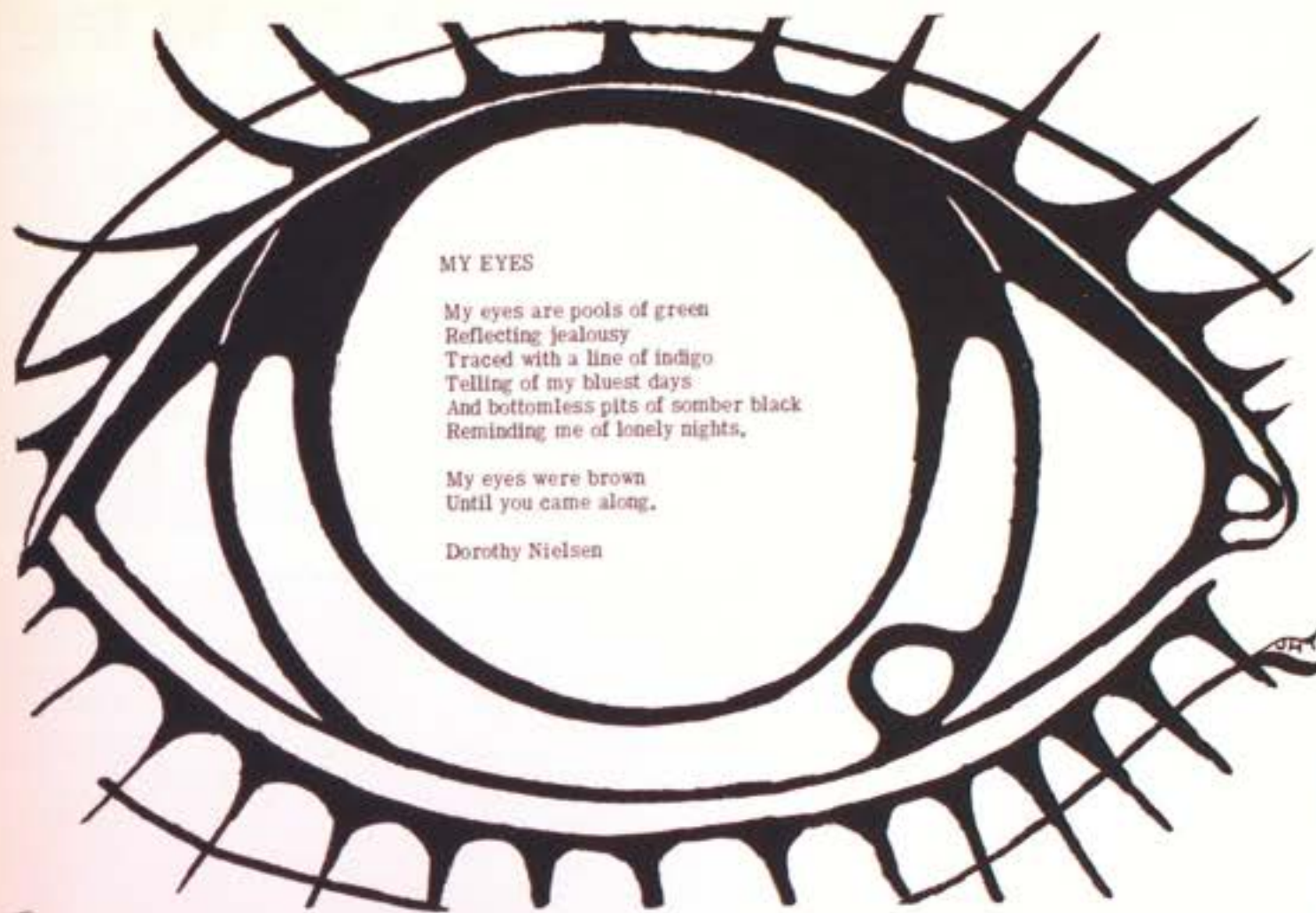
Next the bottom dropped into a deep cavern of dark adventure. I turned around and looked. Should I stay and explore this new mysterious darkness? or go back?

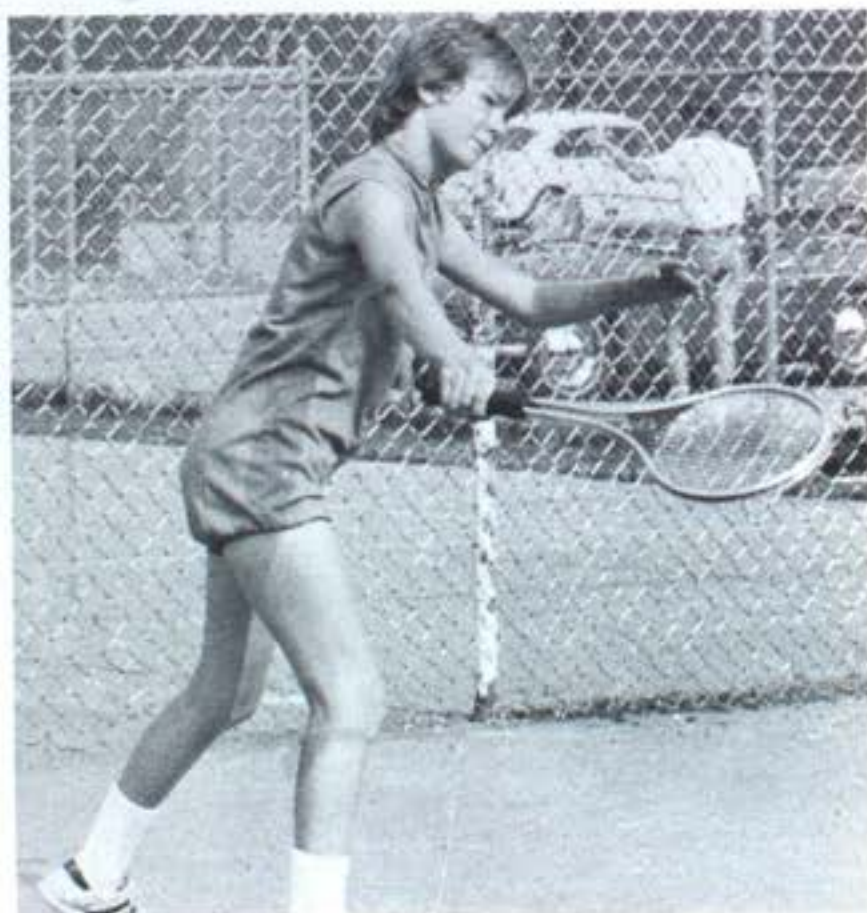
