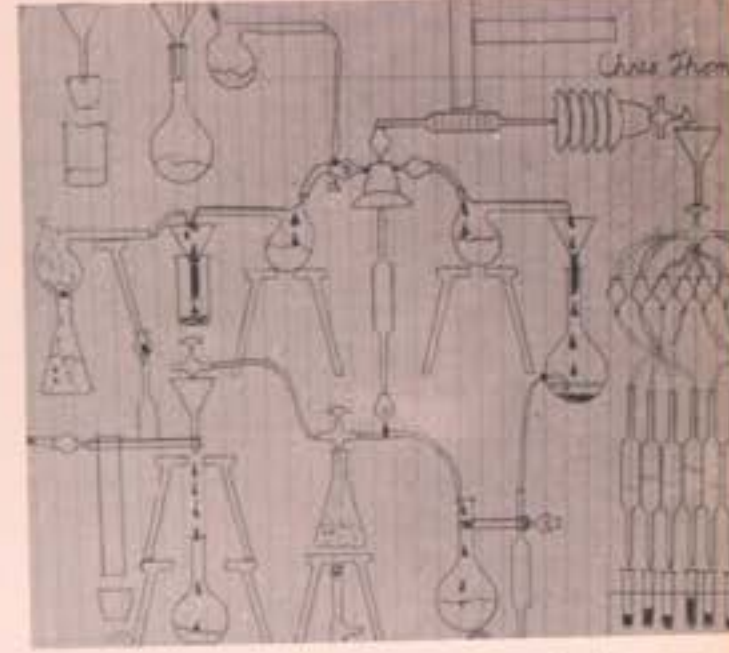

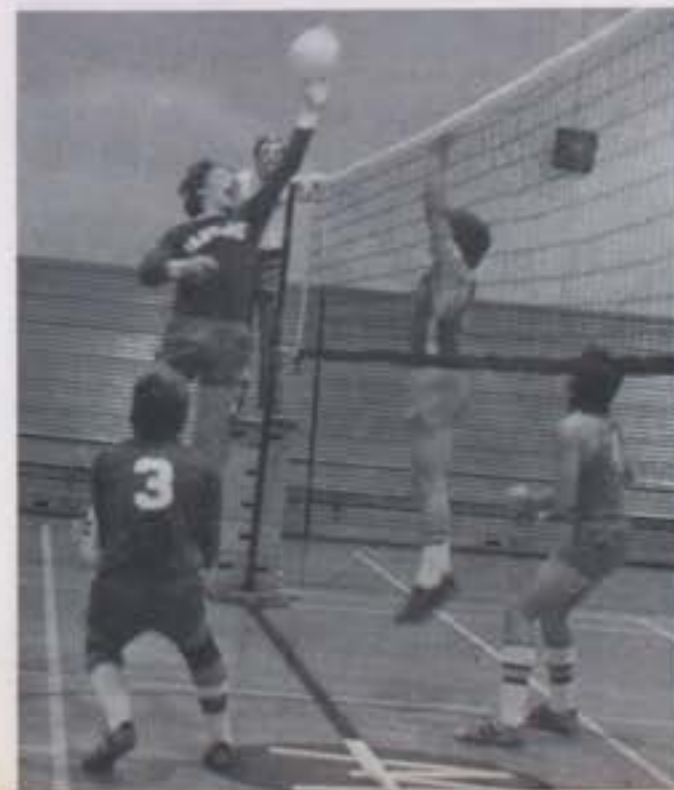

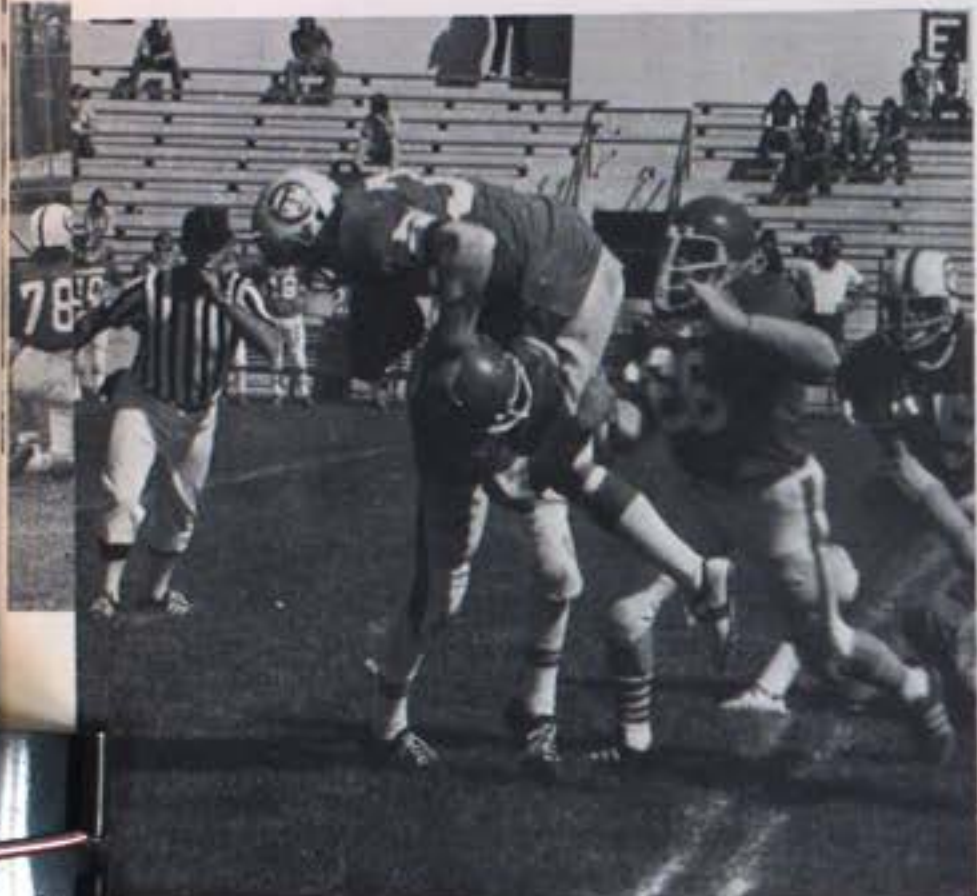

## Tartans big on comebacks

If the majority of the games played in the Windsor Secondary Schools Association senior football league this fall are as exciting as Thursday afternoon's curtain-raiser at Windsor Stadium, then a most interesting season is in prospect.

Walkerville Tartans, down 19-0 after a little more than 15 minutes of play, rallied twice to edge Centennial Cougars 27-26 before about 1,000 spectators.

Darrell Goertzen scored a touchdown with 53 seconds left to play to knot the count at 26-26 and soccer-style placekicker Jim Geier won the game for the Tartans with the successful extra point.

It was a heartbreaking loss for the Cougars who completely dominated the early action. They later bounced back from a 20-19 deficit at three-quarter time to grab the lead 26-20 with a little more than seven minutes remaining.

In the long run, Centennial beat itself with six fumbles, three of which were lost. The Cougars also had no answer for Walkerville's dynamic running back, Goertzen, who had himself quite a spectacular afternoon.

Goertzen scored three of the Tartans' four touchdowns and, in 33 carries gained 206 yards, 130 of those in the wide-open second half.

All of his TDs came on short-yardage situations—one, two and one yard. Kavan Barker collected 23 of his 57 net yards on one stunning touchdown scamper early in the third quarter.

Geier converted three of the four major scores. Scott Peebles and George Thomas called touchdowns on identical two-yard rushes in the first quarter. Quarterback Dal Laliberte passed for the final two Centennial majors, 35 yards to Peeble in the second quarter and 71 yards to end Brian Fairley in the fourth.

Bill Brown split the uprights with one of four extra-point attempts for the Cougars and Peebles rounded out his 13-point game by kicking a single to the deadline five seconds into the fourth quarter.

That particular point deadlocked the score at 20-20.

Goertzen was almost the goat of the game when, near the three-minute mark of the final period, he gained 24 yards to the Centennial 23-yard line and then fumbled away the ball to the Cougars.

Four plays later, Centennial grabbed the lead 26-20 on a dandy pass-and-run play from Laliberte to Fairley who made a stunning catch while surrounded by three Walkerville defenders.

Walkerville, which realized half of its 20 first downs by rushing in the fourth quarter, was not to be denied, however. Starting from their 35-yard line, the Tartans used 15 plays and an offside penalty against Centennial to march right down the field to Goertzen's third major score.

"Wasn't that some game?" questioned Walkerville head coach Joe Stomp. "I can't ever recall us scoring as many as 27 points in any opening game before."

"Naturally, I'm very happy with our offence today. We knew all the time we could move the ball. Now, we've got to work on our defence."

"Our line was a little scared at the start. We had a lot of rookies in there. But, as the game moved along, they started to do the job. Our first two touchdowns came as the direct result of good hits by our fellows and the recovery of their fumbles (first by Goertzen and second by Dave Wylupek)."

Walkerville rushed for 301 net yards and passed for an additional 30. Quarterback Perry Silvaggi was three-for-three in the pass-pitching department.

Centennial rushed for 161 net yards and 11 first downs, passed for 128 net yards and four first downs. Laliberte completed four of his eight attempts.

Ever wonder why these young heroes wanted to spend all their time after school bating their heads against cold, hard posts, and jumping up and down like a bunch of Mexican Beans? Whatever the reason for their effort, it certainly paid off, especially for Darrell Goertzen, Dave Wylupek, and Kavan Barker. In the selection of the all-city team made by coaches throughout the city, Darrell was the only UNANIMOUS choice. Joining him on the first string was Dave, with Kavan making the third team.

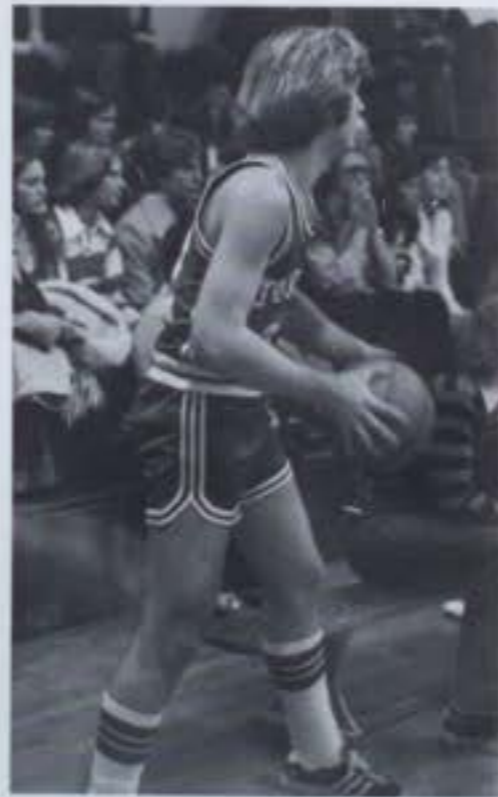

## A TARTAN TRIBUTE



In view of the recent Olympics held in Montreal, the 1976-77 Blue and White staff is proud to pay homage, on behalf of the students of Walkerville, to four former Tartans who have competed in these prestigious games.

Tartan heroes, pictured from TOP TO BOTTOM: Bill Fritz, Ian Allison, Jimmy Stewart, Eli Sukunda

Three of these four men competed in the 1936 Olympics in Berlin. Ian Allison and Jimmy Stewart were members of the Ford Basketball team that won a silver medal for Canada. (This is the highest award that Canada has ever earned in Olympic basketball) In the final game, the team lost to the United States, by a score of 19-7. Basketball was a much lower-scoring game then; Jim scored a total of 27 points during The Olympic competition, while Ian shot for 24 - excellent achievement!

Bill Fritz started his track and field career here at Walkerville as a broad jumper. He placed 5th in the finals of the 400-meter race in Berlin, finishing higher than any other Canadian in that event. He has also competed in the British Empire Games in London, England, and in Australia, and has won intercollegiate championships for the 220 and 440-yard events.

Eli Sukunda attended Walkerville from 1962 to 1966. During this time, he competed in track and field, soccer, cross country, and swimming. In 1975, he was the Canadian Sabre Champ, and he finished 4th in fencing at the Pan-Am Games held in Mexico City that year. He competed in the 1976 Montreal Olympic Games, where he finished 32nd. In the international "Corble Cup" competition held in London, England, he earned 6th place, the best finish ever made by a Canadian.

As a result of his achievements, Eli was recently honoured as co-winner of the Kinsmen "Athlete of the Year" award for 1976. 67

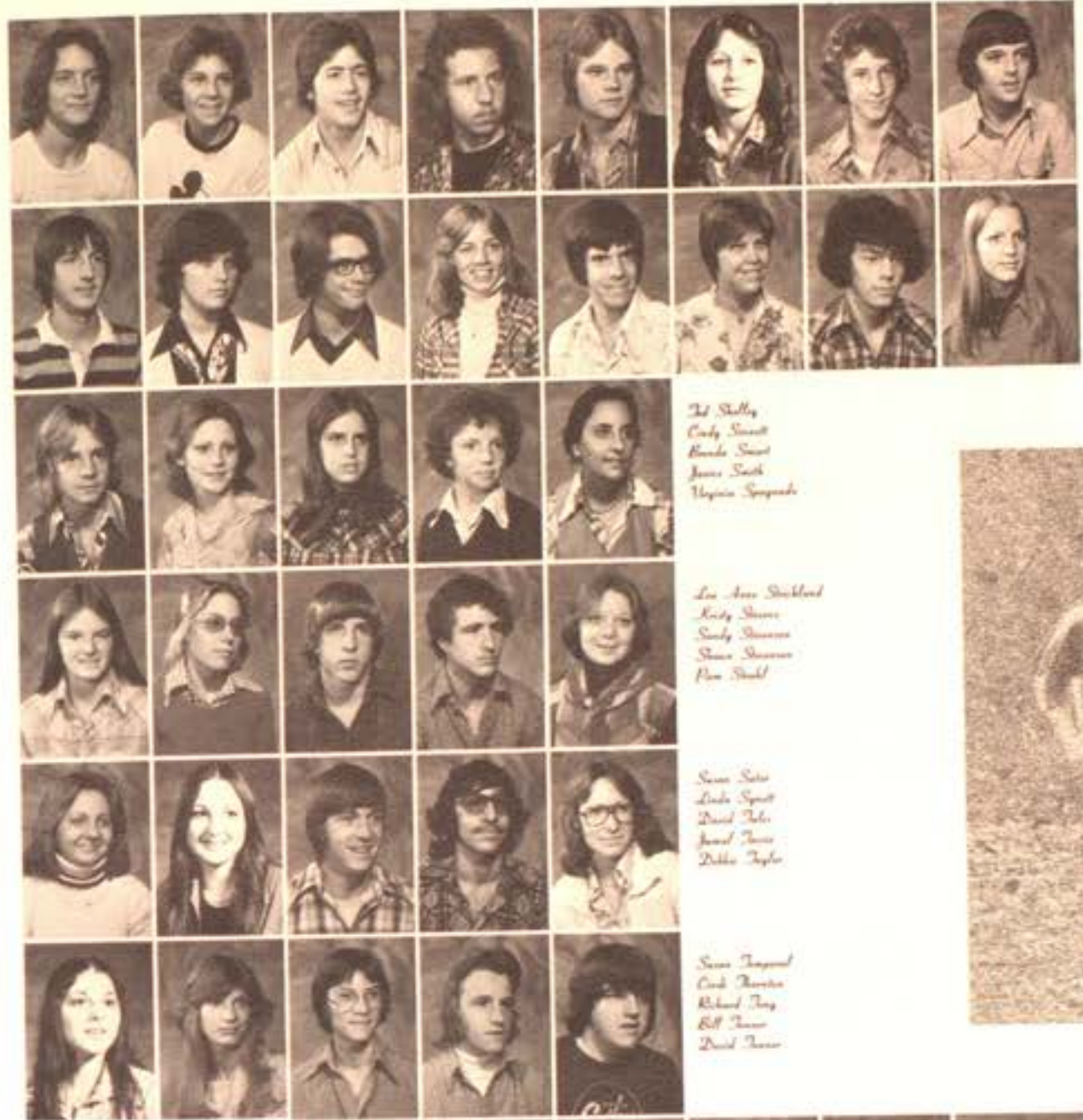

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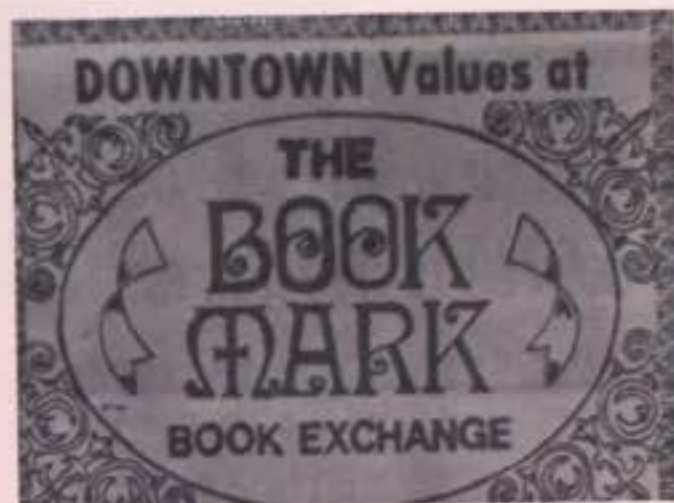

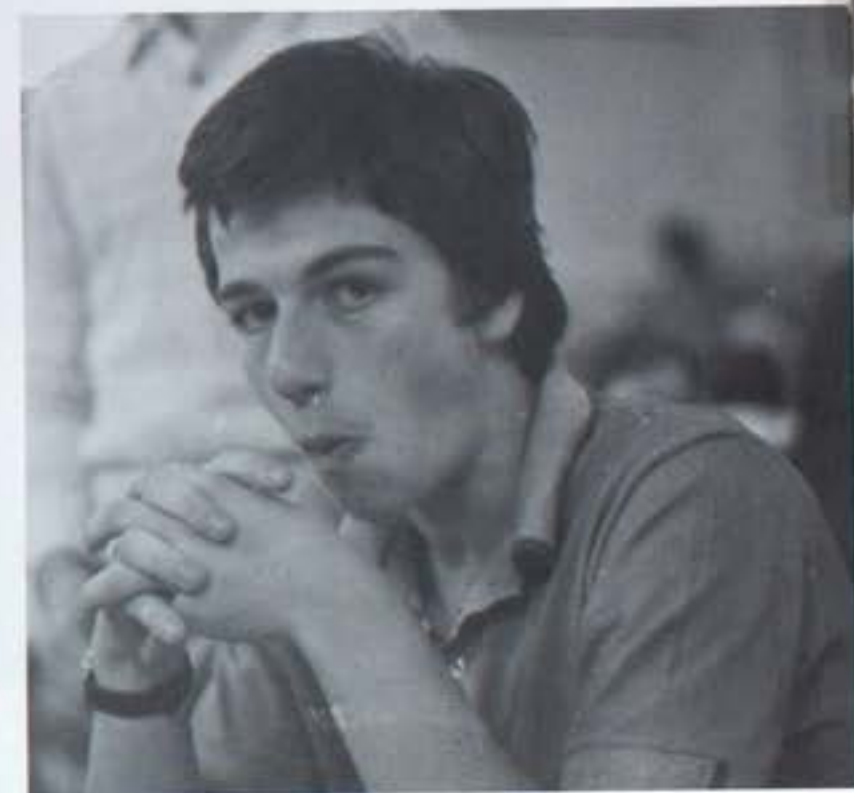
