

As usual, Walkerville had an excellent track team last spring. In the Kennedy Relays, Walkerville won the championship. Dick Rau won the high jump, and set a record for the meet in the low hurdles, and was named the outstanding athlete of the meet. George Mooney won the 440, John Garinger the 880, and Dave McCelland the 100 yard dash. Walkerville also won the Mile Relay, the 880 relay, and the Medley Sprint Relay.

In the W.S.S.A. meet, McClelland won the 100 and 220, Garinger the 880, Rau the high jump, high hurdles, broad jump, and hop, step and jump. Walkerville won the Mile Relay. Rau was the senior individual champion, edging out McClelland. In the intermediate division, Ken Pressello and Dennis Agasse were outstanding in the high jump and hurdles. In the juniors, John Craig, winner of the broad jump, and Mike Weeks were outstanding.

At the W. O. S. S. A. meet, the Walkerville seniors again were champs. McClelland won the 100 and 220. Rau again won four events. He set an Ontario high school record in the high hurdles, running it in 15 seconds flat.

In the Ontario met at Lake Couchiching, the Walkerville thinclads were largely responsible for W. O. S. S. A. winning over the other districts in Ontario and capturing the Manufacturer's Life Trophy, symbolic of the Ontario track champions. Rau won the high hurdles and set a record in the broad jump, leaping 22' 2". In the intermediate division, Pressello won the high jump.

Dick Rau, sponsored by the Hamilton Olympic Club, was nominated for the title of "most outstanding junior athlete" in Canada. This is still to be decided.






ART CLUB
