
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



MR. B. W. BROWN

Since 1952, Mr. Brown has witnessed a great many changes within our building. He has seen a new gym opened and just recently a new music room, library, and several new classrooms have been added. Our school is constantly changing and so are the courses offered within it. There is much more opportunity for the eager student now and our principal has always been pleased to see new courses being made available. The development of the art and music programmes has increased during the past few years and this meets much with the approval of Mr. Brown.

Upon his leaving, our principal has this to say to the student body and teachers of this school; "I will be very sorry to leave Walkerville Collegiate, which has, I believe, the finest group of students in Ontario. However, I am pleased to contribute towards introducing a new school, built for a new type of educational programme."

It is hard for us to say good-bye to a man like Mr. Brown, who has helped us so much and has been such a great asset to the school. We are grateful for the years Mr. Brown has spent at Walkerville and we wish him the best of luck as principal of Windsor's new Centennial Secondary School.



My tenure of office was a most gratifying and rewarding experience. It has been an honour and a privilege to have had the opportunity to be a part of such a friendly and exceptional student body.



When a student reaches 250 points he receives a trophy and his picture in the school library.




GYMNASTICS

CONCERT BAND



FIRST AID CORPS


